Funding Progress

Since fundraising began in February 1998 we have raised \$543,096. Of that amount 38% came from Foundation Grants, 52% from our generous donors, and the remaining 10% from the hard work of raffles, food sales, concerts and interest earned. With 31% of funds needed, we are making progress! Expenses to date have been \$463,153.57.



The St. Joseph Apache Mission Restoration Project is slowly maturing into a professional and admired endeavor in the world of historic preservation. You our donors have made this possible. 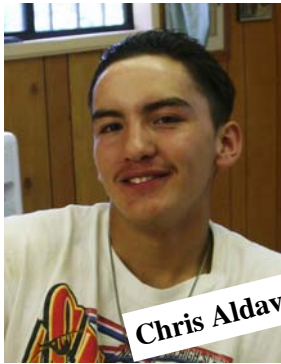

Tommy and Chris cleaning joints above windows to prepare to repoint.



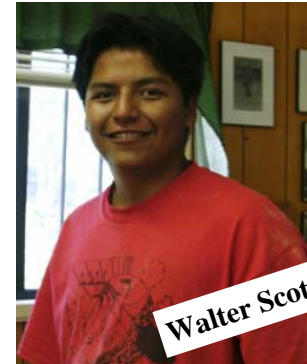
